When you hear the word Hawai'i,

makai for 海側 and mauka for 山側. You can imagine how confusing that can be.

As a huge fan of Hawaiian music, this is like a dreamland as there are a lot of concerts and many of them are free. At a concert, audience members often voluntarily start dancing hula to the music. Nothing can be more relaxing than listening to Hawaiian music sitting on the grass under palm trees (picture 3).
